



While in that role he was a founder of Nativity Preparatory School, a tuition free middle school for low-income boys. He also served as the school's executive director.

In 2022, Rev. Thomas Greene, SJ, UCS provincial, appointed Curran as the Coordinator for the new established Jesuit Prison Education Network (JPEN). In this role, he coordinates the efforts of the 11 Jesuit colleges and universities involved with college credit prison education.
